The Georgia Charter Schools Association supports, fosters, and advocates for the development of high-quality public charter schools and networks that improve opportunities for students throughout the state.

Est. 2001 as a Georgia non-profit, 501(c)(3) corporation and the membership organization for charter schools and petitioners.

Membership = operational charter schools, charter school petitioners, charter school developers, and charter school operators. (Approximately 85% of Georgia charter schools are active GCSA members.)

FRC Origin Story: A 2019 study of GA's charter school facility/financing environment revealed that charter schools spend TWICE what districts spend on facilities despite lacking access to dedicated funding streams like ESPLOST dollars and revenue bonds that traditional public schools use to offset capital costs. The primary recommendation from this study was to create a statewide facilities "hub" that could address GA's multifaceted issues. **As a result, GCSA launched its FRC in July 2020.**



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
