Did you know the eligibility category of Autism was not recognized until 1990? In the 1990 reauthorization of Public Law 94-142, the law's name was changed to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). Two eligibility categories were added - Autism and Traumatic Brain Injury. The addition of the new eligibility areas did not mean that the disability areas were not served prior to 1990 but would have been included under another category best describing the presenting disability. I have included a number of resources below about Autism, some from the national level while others are from Emory Autism in Atlanta. Nationally, statistics from school year 2022-2023 reflect 12.8% of students with disabilities fall under the Autism eligibility area. More boys are identified than girls as compared to the rate for other disability areas. Students ages 14-21 identified with Autism were less likely to drop-out of school but more likely to only receive a completion certificate. Students with Autism are more

likely to be served in more restrictive environments than other students with disabilities. A review of just a few statistics should give pause to consider how children with Autism are served as well as the resulting outcomes.

OSEP Fast Facts: Children Identified with Autism

OSEP released a new OSEP Fast Facts: Children Identified with Autism, which takes an updated look at data for children whose primary disability is autism.

Highlights from 2024 OSEP Fast Fact: Children Identified with Autism In SY 2022-23, the percentage of students with disabilities identified with autism is 12.81%. States report a range from 5.76% to 17.28% of students with disabilities identified with autism.

In SY 2021-22, Students with disabilities identified with autism were less likely to be subject to a disciplinary removal than all students with disabilities. In SY 2022-23, States/entities and LEAs were more likely to identify males with

In SY 2022-23, States/entities and LEAs were more likely to identify males with autism than females when compared to all students with disabilities.

In SY 2021-22, students identified with autism, ages 14-21, exiting school were less likely to drop out and more likely to receive a certificate than all students with disabilities.

In SY 2022-23, States/entities and LEAs are more likely to identify Asian students with autism when compared to all students with disabilities. In SY 2022-23, students identified with autism were less likely to be served


inside the regular class 80% or more of the day than all students with disabilities.

Practice Pointers – Early Childhood Transition Conference and the Parent

TThe Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services (OSERS) has emphasized in a Questions and Answers Document that at the transition conference, local educational agency (LEA) personnel should explain to the family the Part B eligibility requirements and evaluation procedures and inform the family that they can request to invite their Part C service coordinator to the initial individualized education program (IEP) Team meeting. LEA personnel should also provide information about Part B program options, as appropriate, to inform parents in their decision-making. Part C personnel must provide parents with information about preschool services under Section 619 of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). Additionally, to avoid duplication of effort, the LEA should consider all relevant Part C assessment information in the context of the evaluation and Part B eligibility determination process. Together, with the Part C personnel and the family, the LEA should identify any gaps in assessment information needed to determine Part B eligibility and decide who will be responsible for completing or gathering additional information. Further, the LEA should identify the next steps, roles, and responsibilities that are to be documented in the transition plan. If the LEA has not already provided the parent with procedural safeguards as required under 34 C.F.R. § 300.504, they should do so at the transition conference. Similarly, the LEA must obtain the parent's consent to conduct an initial

evaluation to determine the child's eligibility for services under Part B if consent has not already been obtained.

Drawdown of Funds Reminder

This is a reminder to follow your local procedures and GaDOE's general guidance for drawing down funds in accordance with your approved budget and grant expenditures. To ensure that local education agencies (LEAs) are appropriately drawing down available federal grant funds through the first 15 months of the 27-month period of availability, the Georgia Department of

Education (GaDOE) monitors the drawdown of funds. Additionally, each LEA's Consolidated Application (Con App) shows the real-time drawdown percentage for each grant. Through the first 15 months, the generally anticipated rate of draw for LEAs running full-year federal program-funded supports and services is as follows.

October 31	up to 27% funds used	April 30	up to 67% funds used
November 30	up to 33% funds used	May 31	up to 73% funds used
December 31	up to 40% funds used	June 30	up to 80% funds used
January 31	up to 47% funds used	July 31	up to 87% funds used
February 28	up to 53% funds used	August 31	up to 93% funds used
March 31	up to 60% funds used	September 30	100% funds used

Carryover for the IDEA 611 and 619 grants were loaded in December and finalized late January. If your LEA has carryover and has not submitted a carryover amendment, please submit an amendment as soon as possible.
