Leaders, Metro West GLRS, CEEDAR and the Georgia Department of Education) have concluded their second year of the teacher induction program. The celebration was positive, encouraging and moving. To hear in the students'

### The sound of inclusion rings loud and clear at CCS

In a testament to resilience and the unyielding spirit of the human will, Carrollton High School student Jack Lanaeus has a unique way to experience the excitement of high school sports despite his blindness: the Trojan Nation Network (TNN). "TNN has enabled me to listen to many CHS sporting events, something I was unable to do before," said Jack. TNN features weekly

podcasts with teachers, students, administrators, and coaches, with the goal of keeping the community informed about things happening on campus. In addition to podcasts, TNN provides audio coverage for all Trojan football games and select broadcasts for all other Trojan teams.

Born premature, Jack lost most of his eyesight as a four-month-old due to a severe case of retinopathy of prematurity that over a dozen surgeries could not reverse. "Jack has never met a stranger and loves talking about sports and weather with friends wherever he goes," said Laura Lenaeus, Jack's mother. "He enjoys being part of the morning broadcast team as the weather reporter and singing in CHS chorus productions." Last week, Jack had the opportunity to be a special guest host on the TNN broadcast. "I really enjoyed being on TNN," said Jack. "I have wanted to be on a broadcast since I started listening last fall." Jack's mother said though he has faced many challenges in his life, he's worked hard to overcome them. "Jack has faced many hurdles along the way physically, medically and academically," said Lenaeus. "He has worked incredibly hard to meet these challenges and continues to find solutions and adaptations that allow him to get the most out of life, and he does it with a level of energy and enthusiasm that is unmatched."

Matt Skinner, TNN host, said he was happy to learn that Jack listens to the broadcasts. "It's awesome to see how the network has enhanced his experience

with sports in ways he couldn't access before." In a world so often dominated by visual stimuli, Jack's story shows how determination and innovation can lead to inclusion. It's not only a personal triumph but also a reminder of the need for accessible avenues, ensuring every student can connect with their school community. TNN has seen success in its inaugural year with more than 1,600 app downloads between Apple and Google Play. There are currently 28 podcast episodes and 30 live broadcasts that have been produced.

Thank you, Carrollton City Schools, for including all students in the entire school experience. A big shoutout to Mary Raburn, Director of Student Services, and Matt Skinner, TNN host!

Mrs. Johnson left the classroom in 2019 to serve as a Special Education Coordinator, focusing on the secondary level and in the 2023-2024 school year, she shared that she was blessed to begin serving as the Director of Special Education for Chattooga County Schools, and absolutely loves going to work each day to support students, families, and educators.

Mrs. Johnson enjoys spending time with her husband, a long-time educator and football and baseball coach. Their two sons are actively involved in the same sports their father coaches, and the couple spend most of their free time, miniature schnauzer in tow, watching the boys on the field.

## Georgia STABLE/Path2College Matching Scholarship



We're thrilled to announce that for the calendar year 2024, OST is once again collaborating with Georgia's Path2College (P2C) 529 Savings Plan and the

Georgia STABLE logo

Georgia STABLE Program to offer the GA STABLE/P2C Matching Scholarship, which can provide up to \$2,500 to eligible children with disabilities.

A Georgia STABLE account is a way for disabled Georgians to save for qualified expenses and invest for future needs without losing eligibility for certain public benefit programs, like Medicaid or SSI. Georgia STABLE accounts provide financial independence and empowerment for individuals with disabilities by dramatically increasing the ability to save and invest. Georgia STABLE accounts are made possible by the Achieving a Better Life Experience "ABLE" Act passed by Congress in 2014.
