

The Georgia Department of Education is dedicated to preparing students for 21st Century workplace careers by providing high quality educational opportunities in STEM fields. STEM represents the fields of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. STEM education encourages a curriculum that is driven by problem solving, discovery, exploratory learning, and student-centered development of ideas and solutions. The saturation of technology in most fields means that all students, not just those who plan to pursue a STEM profession, will require a solid foundation in STEM to be productive members of the workforce.

Georgia STEM goals:

- ▶ Empower students to become innovators and technologically proficient problem solvers

- ▶ Ensure that all students have access to the appropriate technology conducive to enhancing their learning experiences both in and outside the traditional classroom
- ▶ Increase student 21st century skills and technological literacy by providing students with opportunities to use the technical tools of the STEM industry
- ▶ Guide community understanding of the importance of STEM education and build capacity to sustain a viable STEM educational program to prepare students for work and life in the 21st century
- ▶ Increase Georgia's capacity to provide high quality K-12 STEM professional learning opportunities
- ▶ Nurture partnerships that allow schools and the business sector to join efforts to improve students' STEM-career opportunities
- ▶ Increase the number of students pursuing careers in STEM-related fields and/or post-secondary STEM related education/training

There are currently four schools that have received STEM certification and several "STEM at Home" programs that are designed to help parents start early in helping young ones develop an interest in the fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Progressive Steps: Help Your Child Overcome Stuttering

Stuttering is a speech disorder that makes someone repeat speech sounds that he or she finds difficult to pronounce. More than half of children who stutter recover naturally and the other half are able to develop fluency with speech therapy programs and techniques they can practice at home with their parents. At times, children are ridiculed for having this challenge which can greatly impact their self-esteem and

academic achievement.

Parents can help their child develop fluency by:

- ▶ Providing a relaxed, unhurried environment. A high-pressure lifestyle can worsen the stuttering.
- ▶ Listening patiently; do not interrupt your child or finish sentences for them.
- ▶ Avoiding the tendency to criticize and correct every statement your child makes.

- ▶ Acknowledging the issue in a positive and supportive way can put your child more at ease. Perhaps you could say "sometimes it is not easy to say what we want."
- ▶ Above all, communicate your acceptance of them.

CCGPS: What Should Parents Know?

The Common Core Georgia Performance Standards (CCGPS) is a state-led effort that provides a set of consistent K-12 academic standards to prepare all students for college and career ready success. Simply stated, these academic performance standards provide clear expectations about what knowledge, skills, and practice students should have and learn at each grade level. Nationally, these standards are referred to as Common Core State Standards (CCSS), but since its adoption in Georgia, these standards are now referred to as CCGPS.

These standards help guide teachers and parents on what they need to do to help students graduate from high school prepared for college or a career. The CCGPS also guides both curriculum (the subject matter taught at each grade level) and assessments (tests that determine the level of learning a student has achieved). Overall, these standards will improve educational outcomes for all students.

Parents are encouraged to look through the common core standards to get a feel for what their children will be learning as they move through school. The following list consists of resources along with their corresponding websites that have been designed to assist parents with understanding CCGPS and

the impact it will have on their child's education:

► **National PTA - Grade-by-Grade Parent Guides for Student Success**

-this resource focuses on the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) that explore what students should be learning at each grade in mathematics and English Language Arts/Literacy in order to be prepared for college and careers. The Guide is available in English and Spanish in various formats such as a color or black and white four page version or an abbreviated two page version.

-this resource is designed to support parents' understanding of the Common Core State written for grades K-8 in English and K-5 in Spanish. They are similar in some respects to the National PTA Parent Guides, but are more detailed in some areas, and more focused on the progression of student academic achievement over time.



PARENTS, DID YOU KNOW...

Parents who allow their child to play a role in setting their curfew have a higher compliance rate. Discuss the matter with your child and allow him or her to suggest a time and offer reasons for that preference. Research has shown that welcoming school environments provide parents with a give-and-take relationship where they feel that they belong to the school, and the school belongs to them. This sense of belonging motivates parents to be more active in their children's education, which in turn has a positive impact on student achievement. Parents are encouraged to be present and active in all aspects of their child's learning at both school and home. There are many benefits to having a family-friendly school.

Family-friendly schools:

- ▶ Make students want to learn!
- ▶ Make parents want to attend school functions and volunteer!
- ▶ Make school staff enjoy their jobs!
- ▶ Make community members want to invest in the school!
- ▶ Improve customer service and parent-school communications!

Ultimately, welcoming environments make the


school a place of trust, safety, and a resource to students, parents, and the community at large. The first National PTA Standard for Family-School Partnerships is centered on welcoming all families. It acknowledges that families should be active participants in the life of the school and feel welcomed, valued, and connected to each other, to the school staff and to what students are learning and doing in class. All schools are being encouraged to create the type of school climate that makes all families feel welcome. Parents and students benefit when a school is welcoming.


