

External Evaluation Project

- 2011 online survey of more than 300 enrollees in 6 states
- Preliminary Findings:
 - 90% of counselors find the modules “useful” or “very useful”
 - 81% would recommend the training to their colleagues
 - 72% of counselors report they are changing their practice as a result
 - 78% are implementing their action plans



COLLEGE TEXTBOOK GRANTS

Book Grants to dual enrollment students in Early College, Move on When Ready, and GED Dual Enrollment programs are available to fund college textbook costs not covered through Georgia's dual enrollment funding.

DUAL ENROLLMENT

Provides students with the opportunity to take college coursework while in high school and receive high school and college credit.

FUNDING

1. Accel - Approved academic coursework towards associates or bachelors paid by state appropriated funds.
2. Hope Grant – Approved technical coursework towards certificates and diplomas paid by lottery funds.
3. Move On When Ready – Any full time college coursework paid by state appropriations as a result of Georgia Law.





COURSE ARTICULATION

- In March 2012 additional 17 general education courses in the Technical College System of Georgia (TCSG) as transferable to the University System of Georgia (USG) for credit in the core curriculum, the basic courses all students must take to earn a degree.

NEAR PEER PROGRAM


ADULT LEARNING CONSORTIUM

SIXTH GRADE CHECKLIST



CREATE A GCollege411 ACCOUNT

If your school hasn't already created an account for you then you can do it yourself. To create an account:

1. Go to GCollege411 homepage
2. Click on Create an Account
3. Select Middle School or Junior/High School Student
4. Enter your birth date
5. Click on Find and scroll down to find your school (look for the full name of your school)
6. Select the year of your high school graduation
7. Enter an account name you will be able to remember such as student ID number and last name and then a password that you will remember such as your birth date



TAKE A CAREER ASSESSMENT

During your 6th grade year you should take at least one Career Assessment. This will help you begin to discover the career path that is right for you based on your personality and interests.

You have SIX to choose from:

- Career Cluster Survey
- The Career Key
- Basic Skills Survey
- Interest Profiler
- Work Values Sorter
- Transferable Skills Checklist

When you find careers that interest you, add them to your portfolio.

HOPE Program SUMMARY

HOPE Scholarship

- Students must graduate from high school with a 3.0 GPA as calculated by the Georgia Student Finance Commission for a college prep diploma or a 3.2 for a career tech diploma. Students graduating under the single diploma type must have a 3.0 GPA as calculated by GSFPC.
- Students must maintain a 3.0 GPA in college, they may only regain the HOPE Scholarship one time.
- The HOPE Scholarship will not pay for remedial or developmental courses.
- A student may receive the HOPE Scholarship until the first of these events:
 - The student has earned a baccalaureate or first professional degree,
 - The student has attempted at any postsecondary institution a total of 190 quarter hours or 127 semester hours,
 - The student has received a total of combined payment of 127 semester hours or 190 quarter hours from the HOPE Scholarship, HOPE Grant, and Accel program (Accel payments made beginning with Fall 2011 term are excluded from the 127 hour cap); or
 - Beginning with those students receiving HOPE for the first time on or after July 1, 2011, seven years from a student's graduation from high school or the equivalent; provided, however, that for a student that serves on active duty in the military during such seven-year period such active duty service time will be credited back to the seven years.
- The HOPE Scholarship will pay:
 - At an eligible public postsecondary institution, for FY2012, a percentage amount of the standard tuition charges from the previous year. In subsequent years, the award amount will be a percentage of the immediately preceding year's HOPE Award Amount (view the chart on GCollege411 to find award amount).
 - At an eligible private postsecondary institution, a percentage amount of the HOPE award amount for private colleges.

Rigor Requirements

For students graduating on or after May 1, 2015, they must pass 2 courses from the following types of courses:

- Advanced Math;
- Advanced Science;
- Advanced Placement (AP) in core subjects;
- International Baccalaureate (IB) in core subjects;
- Core subjects taken at a University System of Georgia (USG) Institution; or
- Advanced Foreign Language

For students graduating on or after May 1, 2016, they must pass 3 courses.

- ◆ Use pull down menus for your month and day of birth and type in the 4-digit year. Type in your full school name or choose find to choose from the list of schools already in the database.

- ◆ Click Next at the bottom of the page.

PLAN YOUR STEPS

There is so much to do in high school – let GCollege411 help you navigate through the steps. This checklist can help you know what you need to do to get ready for college.

NINTH GRADE CHECKLIST

- ✓ Update Your Profile within Your Portfolio to reflect that you are now a High School Student and create a connection to your high school.
- ✓ Visit the Career Planning tab to explore careers and save 3 new careers in Your Portfolio.
- ✓ Meet with your counselor to go over Your Plan of Study in the High School Planning section.
- ✓ Explore Programs and Majors and start thinking about what you might want to major in in college.
- ✓ Set short-term goals for yourself – academic, career, or personal. You can enter these in Your Portfolio.
- ✓ Check out Prepare for College in the College Planning section to find out what your postsecondary options are, as well as college entrance requirements.
- ✓ Use the College Savings Calculator under Financial Aid Planning to help figure out how much you need to start saving – or continue to save – for college.
- ✓ Explore extracurricular activities in your school and community and record your participation in Your Experiences.

TENTH GRADE CHECKLIST

- ✓ Meet with your counselor to review Your Plan of Study to be sure you're still on track.
- ✓ Learn about the College Credit Now options to help you discover how to earn college credit while still in high school.
- ✓ Take the PSAT in October.
- ✓ Talk to your counselor about the tests you'll need for college admissions and take advantage of the FREE test help available in the College Test Prep section.
- ✓ Start exploring colleges in Georgia and nationwide to find schools that interest you and save your top choices to Your Portfolio.
- ✓ Continue to track your GPA eligibility for the HOPE Scholarship at Your HOPE GPA.
- ✓ Keep volunteering and participating in extracurricular activities such as sports and school organizations.

The College Access Challenge Grant provides clear information for transfer and dual enrollment students about which courses and programs will transfer within Georgia's public higher education system.

Program Summary

The College Access Challenge Grant program seeks to increase postsecondary degree attainment of prekindergarten to grade 12 students traditionally underrepresented in higher education. These students include first-time freshmen, transfer students, adults returning to college, and the military. It also works to increase degree attainment of Georgia's low income adults with some college credit but no degree.

The College Access Challenge Grant program emphasizes performance, partnerships, and the overall value to higher education as part of its metrics for success.
