NOTE: Students have many options to **ENTER** and **EXIT** from their academic studies into the workforce. When a student graduates from high school, they are eligible to choose one of many **ENTRANCE POINT** options: **1.** Enroll in either a 2 or 4 year post-secondary program; **2.** Enroll in an apprenticeship program or the military; or **3.** Enter the workforce using technical skills learned in high school. When a student finishes a 2- or 4-year degree program, they may choose to **EXIT** and **1.** Enroll in an apprenticeship program or the military; **2.** Enroll in a professional university degree program; or **3.** Enter the workforce using technical skills learned.

Business Accounting Career Pathway - Industry Credentialing for High School Students

Upon completion of sequenced courses in the Business Accounting Career Pathway, students are eligible to complete the Industry-Recognized student credential for fulfillment of the End of Pathway Assessment. Secondary students completing the Business Accounting pathway will be able to sit for the National Industry Credentialed assessment offered on-line from NOCTI –Accounting Basics and NOCTI – Business Financial Management. Once mastery is reached, students will receive recognition for completion and use this credential in conjunction with their job or continuing training. Georgia offers a dual credit program titled Dual Enrollment. You need to talk with your parents, school counselor, or advisor about the proper courses to take each year in high school and dual credit.</p> <p>Students completing the course work in this Plan, will have earned/completed an Industry Credential, Technical Certificate of Credit (TCC), Associates of Applied Science Degree, and/or Bachelor's Degree.</p>
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Postsecondary Transition

- Students who will continue their education in a Program of Study at one of the University System of Georgia institutions should prepare to take the ACT or SAT for admissions. Tests for admissions may vary from institution to institution. Contact the selected institution for specific testing information. Additional admissions information can be found at Staying On Course. - Students who will continue their education in a Program of Study at one of the Technical College System of Georgia institutions should prepare to complete a placement exam.
- Students who will continue their education and training in the US Military should take the ASVAB assessment.
- Students should utilize electronic college and career databases to select the most appropriate postsecondary opportunities to match their selected career field, including registered apprenticeships.
- Georgia's dual-credit programs have been combined into one program entitled Dual Enrollment, in which high school students may earn their high school course credits while taking college courses.

Business Accounting Pathway Description

Business Accounting applies principles and processes for providing customer and personal services. This includes customer needs assessment, meeting quality standards for services, and evaluation of customer satisfaction. Additionally, people in this field are involved in strategic planning and financial literacy, resource allocation, human resources modeling, leadership technique, production methods, and coordination of people and resources.

The business accounting field requires the ability to communicate with stockholders or other investors to provide information or to raise capital and to develop or analyze information to assess the current or future financial status of firms. Business accountants need to establish and maintain relationships with individual or business customers or provide assistance with problems these customers may encounter and be able to establish procedures for custody or control of assets, records, loan collateral, or securities to ensure safekeeping.

Other tasks include evaluating financial reporting systems, accounting or collection procedures, or investment activities and make recommendations for changes to procedures, operating systems, budgets, or other financial control functions. At times there may be a need to evaluate networks within communities to find and attract new business, oversee the flow of cash or financial instruments, plan, direct, and coordinate risk and insurance programs of establishments to control risks and losses, and prepare financial or regulatory reports required by laws, regulations, or boards of directors.
