Wraparound Services

The State Board of Education approved State School Superintendent Richard Woods' recommendation to provide \$1,040,000 for a regional Wraparound Coordinator in each RESA. This is a first-of-its-kind position that will help schools identified for comprehensive and targeted support under Georgia's ESSA plan create and coordinate their wraparound centers. The Department also provided funding for educational technology services, mathematics mentors, English language arts specialists, school climate specialists, subgroup project managers, supports for students with disabilities, and school effectiveness specialists.

Troops to Teachers

The State Board of Education authorized State School Superintendent Richard Woods to accept a \$1,324,170 grant from the U.S. Department of Defense to administer the Troops to Teachers grant program in partnership with the Georgia Professional Standards Commission. The program assists transitioning service members with meeting the requirements necessary to become teachers, and help program participants find employment as a teacher when eligible.

Curriculum and Instruction Update





Suicide Prevention Training

The Georgia Department of Education is sponsoring four suicide prevention training opportunities in August 2018. The training sessions are entitled Suicide Prevention Training: Prevention, Intervention and Postvention. In May 2015, Governor Nathan Deal signed House Bill 198, which requires that all certificated public-school personnel receive annual training in suicide awareness and prevention as part of existing in-service training and professional development programs.

Training includes how to identify appropriate mental health services, both within the school and within the larger community, and when and how to refer youth and their families to those services. This training will provide resources and best practices in suicide prevention, intervening with someone in crisis and dealing with suicides and aftercare (postvention).

Georgia's Annual Dual Language **Immersion Institute Becoming Regional Event**



This year Georgia will host the 5th annual Georgia Dual Language Immersion (DLI) Institute July 17-18 at Douglas County High School. This year's event features opening remarks from State School Superintendent Richard Woods, Douglas County Superintendent Trent North, and World Language state supervisors from Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina.

The event will also feature the renewing of the SALC MOU (Southern Atlantic Language Collaborative), an agreement signed by the Superintendents of Virginia, NC, SC, and GA to facilitate regional collaboration in the area of world languages.

The event will feature sessions for DLI teachers, English partner teachers and DLI administrators at all levels.

Georgia continues its rapid expansion of DLI programs with the opening of 13 new programs, including new programs in Forsyth and Savannah-Chatham.

Georgia's First Japanese-English Dual Language Program Celebrates Ribbon Cutting

On June 14, the International Charter Academy of Georgia celebrated a ribbon cutting to launch the first and only Japanese/English Dual Language Charter elementary school in Georgia, which will provide second language skills and cultural competency and guide students to develop greater cognitive flexibility, increased attention control, better memory, and superior problem-solving skills. Students joining ICAGeorgia's program from kindergarten are immersed in Japanese for 80% of the day, with the remaining 20% in English. Grades 1 and 2 are 60/40 (Japanese/English), and Grades 3-5 are 50/50. English and Japanese teachers, including ESOL and JSOL teachers, use a team-teaching


approach across departments.

Fitnessgram Testing

A reminder regarding required FitnessGram Testing in Physical Education Classes:

160-4-2-.12 COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION PROGRAM PLAN

Each local school system shall conduct an annual fitness assessment program. One time each school year for students in grades one through 12, to be conducted only during a physical education course that is taught by a certificated physical education teacher in which a student is enrolled. Each local school system shall report the individual results of the fitness assessment to the parent or guardian of each student assessed and the aggregate results of the fitness assessments by school to the State Board of Education annually.

Physical Education Standards of Excellence

The State Board of Education approved the Georgia Physical Education Standards of Excellence on Thursday May 3. This was a significant milestone for the physical education community as it provides a definitive direction for planning, instruction and evaluation of physical education instruction for subsequent generations.



Teacher Observation Expert Training

The Teacher and Leader Support and Development team has developed a new training especially for teachers! The Teacher Observation Expert training is designed for teachers to deepen their understanding and perception of the Teacher Assessment on Performance Standards (TAPS) process. Teacher feedback from Terrell County Schools includes:

- The workshop was one of the best I have attended concerning TKES. The TKES IRR training was very informative; I gained a much better understanding of the observation process. Breaking down the videos and measuring observations against the TKES standards was most educational. I feel better prepared to explain the application of TKES standards to observations conducted in the classrooms. This knowledge will make me a better teacher in my room, a better mentor to new teachers in the school, and a better observer during leadership team walkthroughs.
- The IRR (TKES) was very informative. It helped me to better understand the expectation of the TKES standards and what is expected of me during the school year. I feel that the training allows me the opportunity to show my co-workers what to expect when having a walk-through or a formative. This training made me take a deeper look at myself, my teaching methods, and my lesson plans. I really feel that we need to revamp our lesson plan format. We need to include areas that TKES will focus on.

 Overall, this training made me do a self-assessment of myself. All teachers really need this training.

Middle Georgia P20 Teacher Induction


TLSD induction specialists facilitate induction conversations for districts, institutions of higher education (IHEs), and RESA partners. The purpose of these conversations is to ensure effective support for pre-service candidates, induction phase teachers and their mentors. Current regional practices are shared by P20 partners, local needs, and local resources are identified. A regional action plan is created to support next steps.

June's teacher induction conversation will support the Middle Georgia P20 partnerships. Middle Georgia, Heart of Georgia, and Oconee RESAs, their districts. Middle Georgia State University, Fort Valley University, Mercer University, and Georgia College and University will participate in an initial conversation. This technical assistance support is a follow-up from the spring P-20 Collaborative convening conversation. It's official! Beginning 2018-2019, GaDOE will offer a Civic Engagement Diploma Seal to graduating seniors who meet the following criteria:


- Meet the social studies requirements to earn a high school diploma, and

GaDOE Launches Multi-Tiered System of Supports

The Georgia Department of Education (GaDOE) has initiated the development of an integrated framework that will support the holistic needs of students. Georgia's Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) represents a cross-divisional effort among Teaching and Learning, School and District Effectiveness, Federal Programs, Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports, and Special Education.

Through a competitive application process, the GaDOE selected ten school districts to participate in Cohort One. These districts are committed to using MTSS's evidence and research-based practices to empower their students to learn, live, and lead by graduation.

The MTSS district partners include:

- Savannah-Chatham County Public Schools,
- Clarke County School District
- City Schools of Decatur
- DeKalb County School District
- Dodge County School District
- Glynn County School District
- · Houston County Schools
- Marietta City Schools
- Muscogee County School District
- Paulding County School District

Each school will receive support in measurement and evaluation, professional learning and technical assistance, including coaching, necessary to support implementation.

A newly created MTSS GaDOE team will provide multi-phase training and ongoing supports for refinement and sustainability purposes to districts to implement the integrated academic, behavior and social framework.

"MTSS could revolutionize Georgia's educational system," said Program Manager, Karen Suddeth. "MTSS is a partnership between Georgia families and schools that will give educators access to academic and behavioral focused data, which will allow them to respond and adjust instructional practices and meet students' needs more quickly," said Suddeth.

Georgia's MTSS is expected to become one of the primary guiding frameworks for a continuous, data-based, school improvement process supporting children's well-being, academic development, the connectedness of all students to prepare them to be successful high school graduates.



COMPUTER SCIENCE (CS)

End of Pathway Assessments for Teachers

The CTAE end-of-pathway assessments for Computer Science (CS) need not be a mystery. A challenge we've heard from many of our teachers is the difficulty preparing students for the End of Pathway Assessments (EOPAs) that cap our CS/IT pathways. EOPAs are industry-level assessments. As such, teachers are not prohibited from taking these assessments themselves. Teachers who teach a CS pathway can go to an authorized testing center (not their school) and sit for the test themselves to understand industry requirements for these pathways.

GACE Testing

Teachers currently teaching a computer science course in Georgia have two routes to achieving a teacher credential for CS.

One is a course of study leading to a Computer Science Endorsement. This course of study currently is offered at Columbus State University and the Oconee RESA. It will soon also be offered at Georgia State University and Augusta University.

The other route taking the CS GACE exam for an add-on certification. This exam is offered by the ETS in collaboration with the Georgia Professional Standards Commission (GaPSC). The current test is being replaced in October 2018 by an updated version that is more reflective of the breadth of CS offerings we have in Georgia. It is in the best interest of any teacher interested in teaching CS in Georgia to take this new exam as soon as it is released. A study guide that outlines the domains covered is available from the GaPSC and GACE testing organization.

Middle School Computer Science

As computer science education in Georgia grows, the academic structure grows with it. A set of new middle school computer science courses were approved by the State Board of Education this month. These courses will provide a foundation for the existing high school pathways. Each course provides basic content knowledge and experiences that may later be explored in greater depth in an associated high school pathway. The courses are designed to be independent yet complementary of each other, each providing an introduction to the content involved. The courses will be available for the upcoming 2018-2019 school year.
