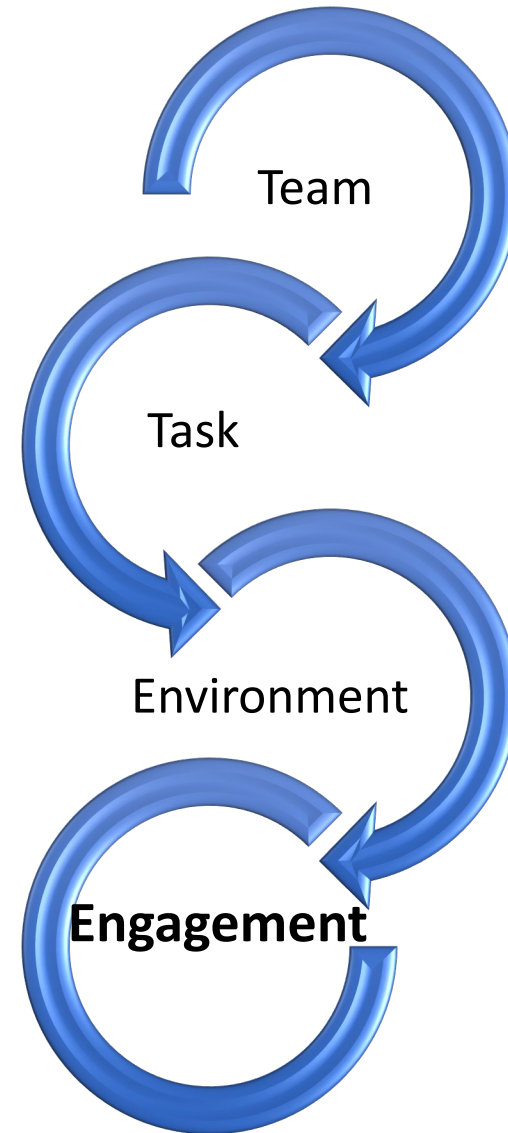


# What is Engagement and Why is it Important

When students display high levels of behavioral, emotional, and cognitive engagement, they are more likely to

- Excel academically
- Form a **stronger sense of connection with their school**
- Have a more positive sense of social-emotional well-being

# Three Important Components of Engagement

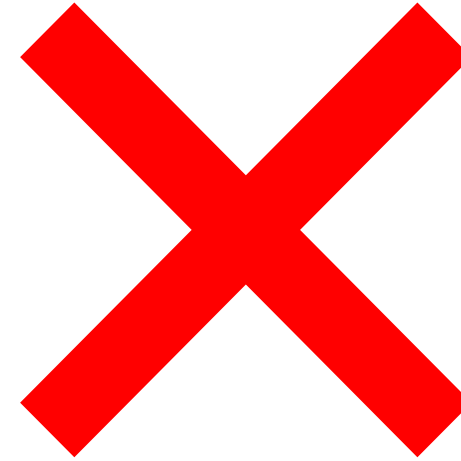

# Engagement Tips to Remember

- Clarify your expectations (often)
- Allow for mistakes
- Give specific, positive feedback

- Make lessons interactive
