

Research has shown that welcoming school environments provide parents with a give-and-take relationship where they feel that they belong to the school, and the school belongs to them. This sense of belonging motivates parents to be more active in their children's education, which in turn has a positive impact on student achievement. Parents are encouraged to be present and active in all aspects of their child's learning at both school and home. There are many benefits to having a family-friendly school.

Family-friendly schools:

- ▶ Make students want to learn!
- ▶ Make parents want to attend school functions and volunteer!
- ▶ Make school staff enjoy their jobs!
- ▶ Make community members want to invest in the school!
- ▶ Improve customer service and parent-school communications!

Ultimately, welcoming environments make the


school a place of trust, safety, and a resource to students, parents, and the community at large. The first National PTA Standard for Family-School Partnerships is centered on welcoming all families.
