#### Goals for 2023-2024

- -Reduce the number of students assessed on GAA 2.0 to 1% or less.
- -Provide instructional support, professional learning, resources, and coaching for Specially Designed Instruction to address academics and behavior.
- -Enhance General Supervision Practices to include the new guidance from OSEP.
- -Reduce the dropout rate for students with disabilities.
- -Increase graduation rates for students with disabilities.

I will discuss the goals and priorities in more detail during our first Director's

Webinar of the new school year on August 8, 2023. Your support will be critical as your outcomes are our outcomes. With focus and determination, I know we will have an awesome school year!

Reference to the new General Supervision Guidance is a topic of great interest. We just received this information last week at the OSEP Leadership Conference. I am including a link for your review. There are some interesting implications. Because of the depth and importance of the guidance, we will schedule a separate webinar for later this month. Please see the announcement below from OSEP.

On July 24, 2023, the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) released a Dear Colleague Letter and Guidance on State General Supervision Responsibilities under Parts B and C of the IDEA. This guidance is a component of OSEP's Results Driven Accountability system, emphasizing improved outcomes for infants, toddlers, children, and youth with disabilities. OSEP is committed to supporting States in improving educational results and functional outcomes for all children with disabilities and enhancing the development of infants and toddlers with disabilities.

Another Dear Colleague Letter was released last week on July 25, 2023, about children served in foster care. Please take time to read the letter. Did you know students in foster care may be up to three times as likely to receive special education services as their peers who are not in foster care? Please ensure proper support is in place for the children.

### Practice Pointers – Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) and Least Restrictive Environment (LRE): Incarcerated Students



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When developing or modifying an individualized education program (IEP) for a student in a correctional facility, IEP Teams should consider whether there has been an interruption in the provision of special education and related services during the student's transfer to the correctional facility and how the break in services has affected the type or amount of special education and related services needed to provide free appropriate public education (FAPE) to the student. In addition, the special factors that the IEP Team must consider in developing, reviewing, and revising the IEP of each student with a disability are particularly relevant to students with disabilities in correctional facilities. Among these special factors is the requirement for the IEP Team to consider using positive behavioral interventions and supports and other strategies to address behavior in the case of a student whose behavior impedes their learning or the learning of others. 34 C.F.R. § 300.324(b)(2). Appropriate implementation of these positive behavioral interventions and supports and other strategies to address behavior should ensure that the student can benefit from their educational program in the correctional facility and hasten the student's transition from the facility and reentry into the community.

### **Experiencing GROW, A HSHT Summer Program**

This past summer, 15 Burke County High School students participated in GVRA/High School High Tech "GROW" (Getting Ready for Opportunities in Work) summer program. The program inspired and engaged

students in many relevant and meaningful opportunities to enhance their knowledge and skills in preparation for life beyond high school, for work or college. The students listened to brief lectures/presentations from experts in the field and participated in three field trips, which involved touring two local businesses and a post-secondary campus (East Georgia College (EGC)). The job-related tours involved a tour of the business facilities and information about scholarship awards and employment opportunities. At EGC, the students toured the campus, experienced the dorms, and received information about college services available for students with disabilities (e.g., how to request accommodations).

Guest speakers came and provided hands-on experiences and/or shared their experiences and knowledge relevant to the following topics: self-advocacy, money management, resume writing, preparing for an interview, meeting employer expectations, teamwork, developing leadership skills, "smart" use of social media, FAFSA, IDEA and ADA, and assistive technology.

Furthermore, all students left the program with positive thoughts, a resume, and a certificate of completion. The GROW Experience offered something for each grade level, especially our juniors and seniors.

**Practice Pointers – Transition Planning: Overview** 

As a student approaches the time to leave high school, it is important that preparations for adult life are well underway. For early transition planning and active participation in decision making to occur for students with disabilities, members of the planning team need to be well-informed about the student's abilities, needs, and available services. Local



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educational agencies (LEAs) and State Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) agencies participate in planning meetings to assist students and family members to make critical decisions about this stage of the student's life and his or her future post-school goals. During the planning process, schools and VR agencies work together to identify the transition needs of students with disabilities, such as the need for assistive or rehabilitation technology, orientation and mobility services or travel training, and career exploration through vocational assessments or work experience opportunities. The individualized education program (IEP), developed under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), for each student with a disability must address transition services requirements beginning not later than the first IEP to be in effect when the child turns 16, or younger if determined appropriate by the IEP Team, and must be updated annually thereafter.

### ESSA and IDEA Federal Programs Cross Functional Monitoring Cycle Is Moving to a 5-Year Cycle

Federal regulations and administrative procedures require that the state educational agency (SEA) monitor the implementation of program requirements and the expenditure of federal funds. Beginning with the 2023-2024 school year (FY24), the Cross Functional Monitoring (CFM) cycle is being updated. The current 4-year cycle has been changed to a 5-year cycle. Some local education agencies (LEA) will not see a change in monitoring year. Other LEAs will be moved one year forward on the cycle. The new Cross Functional Monitoring cycle can be accessed here. As a reminder, all LEAs will continue to be included in the annual Risk Assessment process and review completed by GaDOE each year. LEAs included in the FY24 cross-functional monitoring cycle will receive planning details before the end of August 2023. If you have any questions contact Dr. Kathleen Yarbrough at

behavioral training. This year Bleckley is excited to pilot Robokind's SEL curriculum utilizing the physical robot, Milo, along with programmed avatars. The program is designed to meet the needs of educators as they guide students toward social skills mastery. Their multidisciplinary behavioral approach encompasses speech-language pathology, occupational therapy and ABA principles as students are exposed to a core set of of social skills. Target behaviors are reinforced as students master these social skills. Big thank you to GaDOE for offering districts the opportunity to apply for a capacity building grant which is making programs such as this possible to support our students!





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# Practice Pointers – Transition Services and Requirements

Transition services are integral to a free appropriate public education (FAPE) under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). A primary purpose of the IDEA is to ensure that all children with disabilities have available to them a FAPE that emphasizes special education and related services designed to meet their unique needs and prepare them for further education, employment, and independent living. The IDEA contains transition services requirements for students with disabilities, which must be addressed in the first individualized education program (IEP) to be in effect when the student turns 16, or younger, if determined appropriate by the IEP Team and updated annually thereafter. These requirements are in place for students and youth with disabilities to seamlessly access services and supports to achieve their career goals. The IEP must include: 1) appropriate measurable postsecondary goals based upon ageappropriate transition assessments related to training, education, employment, and where appropriate, independent living skills; and 2) the transition services (including courses of study) needed to assist the student with a disability in reaching those goals. The Rehabilitation Act authorizes a continuum of services, such as pre-employment transition services for students with

disabilities, and transition services, job placement services, other Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) services, and supported employment services for students and youth with disabilities, as appropriate, to secure meaningful careers. Both the school system and VR program provide opportunities designed to prepare students and youth with disabilities for postsecondary education and careers in the workforce.

### Important Budget Reminder: IDEA 611 ARP and IDEA 619 ARP

The IDEA 611 ARP and 619 ARP grants will expire September 30,2023. If your LEA did not fully expend these funds in FY22, funds have been carried over to

FY23. Please ensure that a budget has been added and completed in the FY23 Consolidated Application. Funds must be obligated by September 30,2023 or the funds will expire, and your LEA will no longer have access to the funds. Please take immediate action to ensure funds are expended on allowable expenditures for students with disabilities.

### **IEP Team Meeting Facilitation**

IEP Team Meeting Facilitation is an optional process, not required by the IDEA that state educational agencies (SEA) or school districts may provide to parents and schools. A facilitated IEP Team meeting is the same as any other IEP Team meeting, except that a facilitator joins the meeting. #### Instructional Resources for Assessment



Our district highlight was shared by Dr. Trevor Metzger from Jefferson City Schools. Learn more about the professional learning the district hosted this summer and how the capacity building grant supported their work. Way to go, Jefferson City Schools!

As you are aware, as a state we are required to keep the participation rate on the alternate assessment at 1% or less. We have struggled with this mandate for almost 20 years. For the last few months in conjunction with the Division for Assessment and Accountability, we have been researching, talking with other states and striving to create an improved rubric to align decision making. Remember, you don't choose the assessment, the standards being followed for the student determines the assessment. Through this process, we have asked for feedback from a variety of stakeholders. We still have feedback sessions scheduled until mid-September. The guidance for GAA is not changing - only the rubric will change. Professional learning will begin the last week of September with a Special Education Director's Webinar scheduled from 9 a.m.-12 p.m. on September 26, 2023. In-person professional learning will be offered in Macon on October 4 or 5. (Attend only one day.) Until we have reached all stakeholder groups, resources and professional learning will not be published as we have approval steps and vetting that are also necessary. I want to

reassure each of you that there are no steps to take currently, and the information has not skipped your input. Your session is coming in conjunction with Assessment Directors in September. Change can be a challenge, but I support this work 100%. Only the rubric is changing. The changes are good and necessary to support decision making for participation in the GAA. The decision to place a student on an extended curriculum carries serious consequences as access to the general curriculum is limited. The alternate assessment should only impact 1% or less students at the state level. The rollout will be as IEPs are developed or revised rather than a requirement to examine each IEP immediately. Working together we can accomplish so much! More to come very soon. We are allowing plenty of time for professional learning and guidance. Securing feedback from the rest of our stakeholders is a top priority. # Practice Pointers – Transition Under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA): The Team

Each student with a disability served under the IDEA, must have an individualized education program (IEP) that is developed, reviewed, or revised at a meeting of the IEP Team that includes: 1) The parents of a child with a disability; 2) Not fewer than one general education teacher of such child (if the child is, or may be, participating in the general education environment); 3) Not fewer than one special education teacher or, where appropriate, not fewer than one special education provider of such child; 4) A representative of the local educational agency (LEA); 5) An individual who can interpret the instructional implications of evaluation results, who may be a member of the team described above; 6) At the discretion of the parent or the agency, other individuals who have knowledge or special expertise regarding the child, including related services personnel as appropriate; and 7) Whenever appropriate, the child with a disability. Parents are an essential source of information in the IEP development and play an important role in the IEP Team to establish the student's IEP goals and transition processes. Representatives of other agencies, such as the Vocational Rehabilitation agency, can be invited to participate at IEP Team meetings in which transition services and postsecondary goals are discussed, if that agency is likely to be responsible for providing or paying for transition services to be included in the student's IEP. However, IDEA requires the consent of the parents or the student who has reached the age of majority under State law to invite other agency representatives to participate in the meeting.
