## **New Director Spotlight: Taneka Eaton, Dubois Integrity Academy**

with disabilities while in college, pulled at Ms. Eaton's heartstrings; there is no other group of students she'd rather work with.

Ms. Eaton is huge on memories and is constantly creating them with her family. They are avid readers who enjoy holiday cruises during Thanksgiving.

# Practice Pointers – Individualized Education Program (IEP) Team Excusals: General Education Teacher

QUESTION C-3: MUST THE PUBLIC
AGENCY RECEIVE CONSENT FROM A
PARENT TO EXCUSE MULTIPLE GENERAL

### EDUCATION TEACHERS IF AT LEAST ONE GENERAL EDUCATION TEACHER WILL ATTEND AN IEP TEAM MEETING?

The Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services (OSERS) has emphasized in a Questions and Answers Document that under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), the public agency must ensure that the IEP Team includes "[n]ot less than one [general] education teacher of the child (if the child is, or may be, participating in the [general] education environment) . . . " Neither the IDEA nor its implementing regulations require that an IEP Team include more than one general education teacher. Therefore, if an IEP Team includes more than one general education teacher of the child, the excusal provisions under the IDEA would not apply if at least one general education teacher will be in attendance at the IEP Team meeting.

# QUESTION C-4: IF THE DESIGNATED GENERAL EDUCATION TEACHER IS EXCUSED FROM ATTENDING THE IEP TEAM MEETING, WOULD AN ALTERNATE GENERAL EDUCATION TEACHER BE REQUIRED TO ATTEND?

If the public agency designates a particular general education teacher as the person who will participate in the IEP Team meeting pursuant to the regulation,

and that individual is excused from attending the meeting, consistent with the requirements in the IDEA regulations, the public agency would not be required to include a different general education teacher in the IEP Team meeting.

### Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency (GVRA): Bud McCall Post-Secondary Vocational Rehabilitation Grant

The Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency (GVRA) is pleased to announce the availability of the Bud McCall Post-Secondary Vocational Rehabilitation Grant, which allows up to \$17,725 to be awarded annually to eligible students with disabilities seeking post-secondary and other Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) services.

Candidates for the grant must have an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or 504 Plan. To be eligible, they also must have a permanent disability that results in a substantial impediment to employment and be eligible for GVRA services. To apply, visit the GVRA website.

GVRA's announcement of the grant follows policy changes that removed the financial-needs assessment as a requirement for individuals with disabilities seeking post-secondary opportunities. The changes became effective on January 1. In addition to removing that barrier, GVRA increased the maximum grant amount to match funding offered through the Pell Grant. The Bud McCall Grant provides up to \$7,395 for tuition, \$9,430 for maintenance (room, board, and meals), and \$900 for books annually.

The Bud McCall Grant is named in memory of the first-born son of former State Representative Tom McCall and Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Services Board Member Jane McCall, whose love for others served as an inspiration to his family, friends, and the entire community.

### **SDI District Pilot Application**

Through a partnership with American Institutes for Research, the Instruction and Systemic Improvement unit began our Specially Designed Instruction professional learning series with the goal of increasing knowledge and building

awareness related to specially designed instruction. As we prepare to round out this year's activities with Cohort I, we are happy to announce the application window for participation in Cohort II is officially open!

The SDI Project partnership focus is on developing and implementing high-quality, specially designed instruction practices to improve outcomes for students with disabilities. Through partnership with selected LEAs, the Georgia Department of Education through the Instruction and Systemic Improvement Unit, uses a comprehensive approach that includes supporting LEAs through professional learning, job-embedded training/coaching, implementation and sustainability planning.

# Important Budget Announcement: FY23 Maintenance of Effort Compliance Results Now Updated in the GaDOE Portal

The FY23 Maintenance of Effort (MOE) Compliance results are now updated. The MOE results can be viewed in the GaDOE Portal by going to Special Education Programs > Special Education MOE. LEAs that do not meet compliance may take allowable exceptions, if applicable, to reduce effort. Please see the Exceptions to MOE Requirement document. If your LEA determines there are applicable exceptions, please complete and return the

form to your Budget Specialist with supporting documentation by March 14, 2024. **This is the final deadline**. Reconciliations must take place before this deadline. Please begin the reconciliation process as soon as possible. This process can be time-consuming and may require the support of your Finance Office. If eligible exceptions are not determined, repayment may be required. Please note, that budget amendments will be delayed until MOE Compliance is met.


