

Practice Pointers – Individualized Education Program (IEP): Annual Goals and Short-Term Objectives

IEP annual goals are written to address an individual child's needs/deficits in order to enable that child to be involved in and make progress in grade level

standards. All children are expected to be working toward grade level standards, so it is not necessary to list those standards in the IEP. The annual goals should address the needs described in the present levels of academic achievement and functional performance (PLAAFP) that will enable the child to progress in the grade level standards-based curriculum and meet the child's other educational needs that result from the identified disability. The goals should be written in measurable form and should describe what the child can be reasonably expected to accomplish within twelve months. Under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), for children with disabilities who take

alternate assessments aligned to alternate academic achievement standards, the IEP must also include a description of benchmarks or short-term objectives. Short-term objectives are measurable, intermediate steps or targeted sub-skills to assist in accomplishing the annual goal. The IEP Team may decide to write short-term objectives to support annual goals for any children, as appropriate.

QUESTION 13: HOW CAN IEP TEAMS DETERMINE IF IEP ANNUAL GOALS ARE APPROPRIATELY AMBITIOUS?

The United States Department of Education (USED) has stated in a Questionand-Answer (Q&A) Guidance Document, that the Endrew F. decision is important because it informs our efforts to improve academic outcomes for children with disabilities. As the Court stated, "advancement from grade to grade is appropriately ambitious for most children in the regular classroom;" however, the Court also noted that while these "goals may differ...every child should have the chance to meet challenging objectives." In order to make a free appropriate public education (FAPE) available to each eligible child with a disability, the child's IEP must be designed to enable the child to be involved in, and make progress in, the general education curriculum. The term "general education curriculum" is "the same curriculum as for nondisabled children." We have previously clarified that the phrase "the same curriculum as for nondisabled children" is the curriculum that is based on a State's academic content standards. This alignment, however, must guide, and not replace, the individualized decision-making required in the IEP process. This decisionmaking continues to "require careful consideration of the child's present levels of achievement, disability, and potential for growth."

The explosion was probably heard across most of the United States. Not the way to go about a decision of this nature but I do not regret the road I have taken. Much like nursing, education is a field that helps others but in a different manner. Education has been good for me, and I would not hesitate to make the same choice today. Some of the most thankful moments in my life have involved working with students and their families so I am thankful to serve as an educator.



On Thanksgiving Day, in addition to cooking the traditional feast, the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade will be a part of our morning. The parade feels like the official start of the holiday season. Practice Pointers – Individualized Education Program (IEP): Student Supports

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) requires each IEP to include a statement of the special education and related services and supplementary aids and services, based on peer-reviewed research to the extent practicable, to be provided to the child, or on behalf of the child, and a statement of the program modifications or supports for school personnel that will be provided to enable the child: 1) to advance appropriately toward attaining the annual goals; 2) to be involved in and make progress in the general education curriculum and to participate in extracurricular and other nonacademic activities; and 3) to be educated and participate with other children with disabilities and nondisabled children in the academic, nonacademic, and extracurricular activities. Student supports in the IEP should be based on the student needs identified in the present levels of academic achievement and functional performance (PLAAFP).
