

Wraparound Services

What are

- Planning process used to build constructive relationships and support networks among students and youth with emotional or behavioral disabilities (EBD) and families. It is community based, culturally relevant, individualize, strength based, and family centered. (PBIS)
- A comprehensive, holistic, youth and family-driven way of responding when children or youth experience serious mental or behavioral challenges. (National Wraparound Initiative)



Who Needs Wraparound Supports

Students who exhibit issues with:

- Academics
- Attendance
- Behavior
- Home/Community



Why Wraparound Services

- Wraparound services, like counseling or food support, help address issues of poverty, and when these services are in place, student achievement often soars.
- These services aim to keep children and their families together through individualized services developed in a family-centered, team planning process.



Friends with Wraparound Supports

Nemo- Had a physical disability.



Forrest Gump- Had exceptional needs that required intensive supports.





Friends with Wraparound Supports

The Blind Side- He was in the need of community and family support.



Michael Phelps- He has ADHD attributes success to support of coaches and outside activities that almost ruined career due to self-medicating.





Friends with Wraparound Supports

Whoopi Goldberg- Has Dyslexia was taunted at home by Mother because of her inability to read at a early age.



Steven Spielberg- Has Dyslexia learned how to read two years after classmates. He was bullied at school for not begin able to read.






Friends with Wraparound Support

Justin Timberlake- Has ADD and OCD utilized the supports of a Chorus Teacher to help become successful in Music as a student.



Ratatouille- Has a speech impediment, unable to follow simple instructions and receives support from a rat and mentor chef to be successful.

Who We Were

- Elementary School serving a population of 850 students in grades PK-5th
- 10% Special Education Population
- 8% English Language Learners
- 54% Mobility Rate
- 100% Economically Disadvantaged
- 55% of students have more than 6 days absent from school
- 40 students receiving support via McKinney-Vento Act (Homeless)
- Three-year average CCRPI of 50
- Listed as a Georgia Department of Education Turnaround School

Topics Discussed





Strong Wraparound Services Paves the Way for Strong Instructional Practices





Leveled Literacy Instruction Paras

- 158 Students are pulled daily LLI instruction
- They were targeted because of MAP data which indicated low achievement and low growth
- 8 Instructional Paras are attached to these students for intensive instruction
- 94% of students grew at least three levels using the LLI instruction



Math

- Three Instructional Paraprofessionals to support grades 3rd, 4th, & 5th
- Teachers are utilizing Khan Academy and the Learning Continuum to support students
- Students achieved the highest Georgia
 Milestones scores in the history of the school







Testing Support

- Mock Tests have been made for all students in grades 3rd -5th
- Mock administered 2 times per year; results are shared with each teacher
- Standards are addressed through Tuesday & Thursday tutorial, daily intervention, and teacher intervention in the classroom
- Illuminate Professional Learning Session
- Teachers create weekly assessments utilizing Illuminate to support students





Interventions & Tutorials

- Morning Interventions offered to all students on grades K-5th;
 3rd-5th grades receive support in groups based upon Winter
 MAP Data, Linking Study and Georgia Milestones Assessment,
 students divided into groups based on Developing, Proficient,
 & Distinguished morning tutorial
- Grab & Go Breakfast
- Tuesday & Thursday Tutorial for K-5th grades
- Saturday Tutorial for grades 3rd-5th



Staff Understanding of Data

- Teacher led Data Talks conducted for all Certified Staff Members.
 - Teachers led their own data talks utilizing Winter MAP Data in alignment with the Linking Study.
 - Teachers discussed individual strengths and weakness of each student.
 - Teachers detailed supports that are being provided to assist student with their areas of weakness.

- 46% Mobility Rate
- 100% Economically Disadvantaged
- Double Digit academic gains across ALL content areas



Who We Are


- HIGHEST CCRPI SCORE in the HISTORY of the School of 65 which is a 18.7 point increase
- HIGHEST CLIMATE SCORE rating in the HISTORY of the School of 3 STARS
- Only school in DeKalb County School District to receive \$72,319 from the Governor's Office of Student Achievement
- Only single school in the State of Georgia to receive the School Improvement Grant of \$80,000 for Literacy
- On the Georgia Department of Education Promise Schools List
- On the Georgia Department of Education "Beating the Odds List 2019"



- Grades K-2
 - Math- 3.9% increase within one school year
 - English Language Arts- 3.38% increase within one school year
- Grades 3rd-5th
 - English Language Arts- 25% increase within one school year
 - Mathematics- 25% increase within one school year
 - Science- 47% increase within one school year
 - Social Studies- 39% increase within one school year
- Mobility Rates went from 54% to 46%




Georgia Milestones Content Mastery






Georgia Milestones Progress






Georgia Milestones Closing Gaps




Georgia Milestones Readiness
