Grant Implementation Overview

In Georgia, the Georgia Department of Education sets policy, develops guidance and provides training and technical assistance for Georgia LEAs. Seven field-based staff provide technical assistance by assigned region, currently organized mostly by RESA region. Training is coordinated at a state level and delivered at an annual federal programs conference, coordinated federal program regional sessions, and collaborative Title II, Part A only regional sessions. The GaDOE publishes an annual LEA Handbook and maintains a public website.

The Federal grant (15 month grant cycle) is cyclical in nature, beginning in July and ending September of the following year. In Georgia, LEAs begin by completing an internal Comprehensive Needs Assessment and using it to complete an LEA Equity Action Plan (published on the GaDOE website) and consolidated federal grant application called the Consolidated LEA Improvement Plan (CLIP) (ConApp). Once approved, LEAs submit a budget based on their formula-based allocation (ConApp). Then LEAs administer the grant, submitting budget adjustments/amendments, as needed. Although LEAs can carryover 100% of allocated funds, it is expected that LEAs, in the best interests of teachers and students, draw down funds regularly through the year and expend all funds as budgeted.

Every four years, and depending on annual risk assessment results, LEAs are formally monitored for compliance through GaDOE Cross-functional Monitoring (CFM). Specialists are scheduled to monitor outside of their assigned LEAs. This practice encourages objectivity and fosters a stronger alignment of expectations and technical assistance. In addition, LEAs with increased risk may be monitored through Desk Monitoring. Depending on the monitoring results, these LEAs will complete corrective action in order ensure they have internal controls and protocols that ensure compliance with federal law, federal regulations (EDGAR), and federal and state guidance. Any LEA that does not participate in Cross-Functional or Desk Monitoring completes an annual self-monitoring review. In 2016-2017 GaDOE rolled out a new monitoring platform strengthening internal control features and allowing LEAs to receive and respond to monitoring reports in a more timely manner.

In December of 2015 President Obama reauthorized ESEA from NCLB to ESSA. In the spring congress passed a continuing resolution to postpone implementation until the 2017-2018 school year, maintaining current funding levels until that time. In Fall of 2016 USDE released new non-regulatory guidance for Title II, Part A and Fiscal Issues, including equitable services and redacted existing Title II, Part A Guidance (2005, 2006).

Title II, Part A Specialists provided timely technical assistance to LEAs as necessary to ensure LEA compliance with State and Federal laws and guidance. In addition to

technical assistance sessions, Program Specialists provided professional learning opportunities via individual LEA trainings, regional trainings, and state conferences.

In Georgia, LEAs are required to have an external audit each year. Any audits from prior fiscal years that require program review are reported by the Georgia Department of Audits to GaDOE and GaDOE program staff resolve these audits. These are resolved directly with the LEAs.

Highly Qualified was not required to be reported in 2016-2017 per USDE FAQs on the implementation of ESSA. LEAs conclude the federal fiscal year with a completion report, finalized in GAORS.

Teaching and Learning Staff

We supported federal and state initiatives of rolling out college and career readiness standards by split-funding 2 Teaching and Learning employees who provide complimentary public state-wide training and resources to improve teacher quality and, subsequently, student achievement.

Teacher Keys Effectiveness System (TKES) and Leader Keys Effectiveness System (LKES) Support

We supported two staff who developed and delivered professional learning around the Evaluation System to all LEAs in Georgia. A transition of the electronic platform housing the evaluation system from an external vendor to internal IT support will begin in 2017-2018 and will be effective July 2018. This change requires and development of a new professional learning platform.






FY17 Effectiveness of Funded Priorities




FY17 Self-Reported LEA Vacancies and Title II, Part A Recruited New Hires


FY17 LEA Staff Funded by Title II, Part A (Budgeted)

Program Implementation: Personnel Data





Monitoring Analysis

In FY17 Title II, Part A's monitoring schedule was completely aligned with the Federal Programs Cross-Functional Monitoring Cycle. In addition, the cycle shifted from a three-year cycle to a four-year cycle. Title II, Part A began to share overarching indicators for the first with Federal Programs in the areas of: CLIP submission and monitoring; Fraud, Waste and Abuse; Complaints; and, Private Schools. In addition, the Title II, Part A Program further streamlined monitoring indicators. Due to the transition between NCLB and ESSA the only HiQ/PQ monitoring indicators were Right to Know Notifications and Paraprofessional Credentials.

Following the FY16 rollout of the Uniform Administrative Requirements (2 CFR Part 200) Federal Programs and Title II, Part A began a thorough review of LEA internal controls looking for updated citations and compliance with new standards. We continued to notice a challenge with engaging stakeholders in the annual needs assessment process and suggested the integration of stakeholder roles and names into the FY18 CLIP. We also experienced a high number of monitoring findings linked to problems with LEA drawdowns. This was addressed by a SBOE approved position paper.

5 LEAs returned a total of \$7,823.98 Title II, Part A Funds, .01% of LEA Allocations.

38 LEAs had reports with no findings or recommendations. We believe this steep increase in no findings is largely due to the transition from HiQ to PQ under ESSA.

Audit Resolutions/ Financial Reviews Completed

One audit resolution was conducted in 2016-2017 around not returning unearned funds. Funds were returned as a part of corrective action.
